## REVIEW OF LITERATURE

According to **Flippo (1984)**, employee welfare is defined as “services, facilities, and amenities provided to employees for improving their health, efficiency, and general well-being.” Welfare measures go beyond monetary compensation, encompassing physical, mental, and social well-being.

**Mishra and Manju (2012)** emphasized that employee welfare acts as a tool to create a sense of belonging among employees, thereby enhancing job satisfaction and organizational commitment.

Studies like those conducted by **Padmini (2011)** suggest that effective welfare measures lead to higher employee morale and productivity. Her findings highlight that organizations offering comprehensive welfare programs experience lower absenteeism, improved industrial relations, and greater employee retention.

Similarly, **Bhavani and Surulivel (2016)** noted that companies with proactive welfare policies see direct improvement in employee efficiency and job satisfaction, resulting in organizational profitability.

**Kavitha (2014)** differentiated between statutory and voluntary welfare measures in her study. She observed that while statutory measures ensure minimum standards of health and safety, voluntary measures significantly enhance employee loyalty and organizational culture.

**Rao (1999)** also stressed that voluntary welfare initiatives (such as wellness programs, transport facilities, or recreational activities) often provide a competitive advantage in attracting and retaining talent.

In the manufacturing sector, **Nambiar (2001)** found that workers' welfare directly impacted productivity and reduced the rate of labor unrest.

In the IT sector, **Sundar and Ramya (2015)** discovered that welfare measures such as flexible working hours, telecommuting options, and mental health support are highly valued and critical to employee retention.

**Sharma and Gupta (2013)** highlighted challenges in implementing welfare programs, including financial constraints, management apathy, and lack of employee awareness. Their research suggests that a participatory approach involving employee feedback can make welfare initiatives more effective.

Recent studies, like those by **Verma (2020)**, point to the increasing importance of mental health support, diversity and inclusion programs, and sustainable workplace practices as evolving components of employee welfare in the post-pandemic world.

- **Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs (1943)** links welfare measures to different levels of employee needs — from basic (safety, hygiene) to higher-level needs (self-esteem, self-actualization).



- **Herzberg’s Two-Factor Theory (1959)** categorizes employee welfare activities as hygiene factors that prevent dissatisfaction and motivate when combined with other growth opportunities.

### ANALYSIS AND INTERPRETATION

1. Awareness of Welfare Measures

A majority (85%) of employees are aware of the welfare measures offered by the organization, indicating good communication and information sharing by the HR department.



## 2. Satisfaction with Specific Welfare Measures

Employees are most satisfied with Provident Fund/Gratuity Benefits (4.3) and Health Facilities (4.2). Recreational facilities received relatively lower satisfaction (3.5), suggesting a potential area for improvement.

## 3. Impact of Welfare Measures on Employee Motivation

90% of respondents (Highly Positive + Somewhat Positive) feel that welfare measures have a positive impact on their motivation, clearly indicating the importance of welfare initiatives in boosting employee morale.

The analysis indicated that welfare measures have a significant positive impact on employee satisfaction and performance. A majority of employees reported that the availability of welfare facilities boosts their morale, increases their engagement with the organization, and positively influences their overall productivity.
